Modal Verbs: Can

1. Affirmative: Subject + Can + Main Verb







The boy can swim.



They can sing.



Modal verbs do not change form. The verb after a modal does not end in -s or -ing.

Karen speaks English. (🗸)
Karen is speaking English. (🗸)
Karen can speak English. (🗸)

Karen can speaks English. (*)
Karen can speaking English. (*)

2. Negative: Cannot/Can't







A snake can't paint. A snowman cannot swim. Flowers can't sing.



Contractions are used in spoken English and in informal written English. Contractions are not typically used in formal written English.


